United States Submarines lost in the Month of May

• USS SQUALUS (SS192) 26 Souls lost

USS SQUALUS (SS192) was commissioned 01MAR39 from Portsmouth Naval Shipyard. Eighty four days later while on test dives off the coast of New Hampshire she sank to just above her test depth. Losing 26 of her 59 crew member Squalus had her remaining 33 crew members using the McCann Rescue Chamber. The boat was rescued late the same year.

In May of 1940 the boat was recommissioned as the USS Sailfish (SS192). She was sent to the Pacific where she served with distinction. She earned nine battle stars and a Presidential Unit Citation. She completed ten war patrols.

She was decommissioned 27OCT45 after the end of WWII. 26 Souls lost.

• USS LAGARTO (SS371) 88 Souls lost

Lagarto was commissioned on 14OCT44 out of Manitowoc, Wisconsin. She sat atop of a floating dry-dock down the Mississippi River to New Orleans to whereas she put to sea

While on her way to Pearl Harbor Lagarto stopped off Perlas Island, Panama. This was for a period of training between 20NOV44 and 05DEC44. On the third of December, just two days prior to getting underway, Chief Pat Cole died of coronary thrombosis.

The boat reached Pearl Harbor on Christmas day '44.

Just prior for training to be completed a traffic accident caused a major disruption aboard the Lagarto. Two of her senior well seasoned officers were involved in a major traffic accident. This took the experience of 14 war patrols out of Lagarto's wardroom.

The Lagarto saw very little action for the remainder of the war. She did have a new commanding officer and executive officer. She operated with the submarine Haddock for the next several months.

It appears that the Lagarto got trapped and destroyed by the enemy minelayer, Hatsutaka in the Gulf of Siam on 04MAY45.

88 Souls lost.

• USS STRICKLEBACK (SS415) 0 Souls lost

The Stickleback was commissioned on 29MAR45 at Mare Island Naval Shipyard. She saw very little action in WWII. She arrived at her first and only war patrol destination two days prior to the cease fire.

Basically she was used as a training platform for the following 13 years. She was training with American destroyers off the coast of Hawaii on 29MAY58 when she was hit by the destroyer USS Silverstein. Several destroyers helped the crew abandon the ship before she sank in 1,800 fathoms.

0 Souls lost.

• USS SCORPION (SSN589) 99 Souls lost. Lost 22MAY68.

The Scorpion was commissioned on 29JUL60 out of General Dynamics Electric Boat.

The loss of the USS Scorpion (SSN589) is by far the most mysterious loss in American history.

The American submarine force leans heavily toward believing that the Soviet Union caused her loss. The official doctrine of the United States Government basically supports ANY theory other than that.

There were four submarines lost worldwide in 1968 and the cold war was very close to HOT. Besides the Scorpion being lost the Israeli's lost INS Dakar, the French, Minerve, and the Soviet Union herself losing K129.

If in fact one of our nuclear submarines were lost to Soviet forces WWIII might, no, likely would have broken out.

Other theories about Scorpion are an accidental explosion from one of her own torpedoes, possibly one of her torpedoes in the tube or on a skid in the ship activating and detonating upon reaching the 'distance' to detonate. This would normally be halted by turning the ship around because the torpedo is set not to come back and hit its home.

99 Souls lost

* A Foot note: Gene Adams, Bonefish Base Commander shared with our meeting that out of one of his Nuclear classes his dream sheet was for a fast attack off the east coast. A good friend of his of the same rank and grade asked for a fleet ballistic missile boat of the west coast. Gene got the 'Boomer' of the West Coast and his friend got the 'Attack' boat off the East Coast.

They, being the same rate and rank went in to get their orders changed with each other. They were told that it was too late.

Gene's friend went down with Scorpion, a fast attack off the east coast. A verbal thought Gene expressed as he was completing sharing this with us. He quietly said 'Maybe I could have saved the ship'. We all have our own ghosts.
